Behind the three hit pitching of Jack "fire-ball" Gaskins, the New Bern "nine" took a close 3-2 ball game from Roanoke Rapids. This was their first Conference game and win of the year. The "Bears" had played two non-conference games before this—winning from Jasper High and taking a four inning contest from Camp Lejeune High School.

Roanoke Rapids, supposed to be the strongest team in the conference, fell behind in the fourth inning when Russell sent a single past the short-stop to reach first base, and then coming home on Neal Patterson's smashing double to deep right-center field. Two innings later, the Bears got two more runs sent in by James Westbrook's single with the bases loaded. The Roanoke Rapids team scored two more runs in the bottom of the seventh to finish the scoring for

the day. The Bears collected eleven hits with "catcher and captain", Johnny Connolly, leading the way with two hits in trips to the plate.

In the first game of the year, the "New Bernians" took a 7-5 decision from Jasper High School. Jack Gaskins and Fred Taylor turned in a fine mound job, limiting Jasper to five hits.

Playing in a drizzling rain New Bern took a 7-0 win from Camp Lejeune for the second win of the season. Bunky Stewart, the only southpaw pitcher on the Bears mound staff, turned in a brilliant one-hit four inning ball game. The game was called at the end of four full innings due to rain.
