Choral Concert Huge Success

"SONNY" RUSSELL STARS ON E. C. T. C. BASKETBALL COURT

For the second consecutive week, Warren "Sonny" Russell, who plays in one of the forward slots of the East Carolina Teachers College Basketball Team, led his team in scoring honors. "Sonny" is a freshman at the college this year and a total of 100 points have been chalked up for him in seven games.

As you know, "Sonny" graduated from New Bern High last June. While he was here he excelled in all sports, Baseball, Basketball and Football. "Sonny" played his best game on the basketball court. Playing in the center slot, he made the "All-Conference" team two or three times. This year he is pacing a different team, but he is playing his usual "bang-up" game. Although he is just a freshman, he leads his nearest teammate, Jack Everton, a senior, by 19 points. "Sonny" has made good on 38 field goals and 24 free shots for a grand total of 100 points.

On Dec. 10, "Sonny" was high scorer, and led his mates to a 63-46 win over Wilson Teachers College by racking up 20 points. Again on Dec. 13 "Sonny" was high scorer with 17 points in a 53-43 win over Catawba College. He led the E. C. T. C. "Pirates" with seven field goals and three charity tosses.

The "Pirates" have played seven games thus far, and have won two conference games against no defeats, winning three non-conference contests with two losses in out-of-conference play.

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BEARS WIN THREE STRAIGHT!

After dropping the first two encounters to non-conference opponents, Dover and Aurora, the Bears have come roaring back with three straight triumphs including a victory over the Roanoke Rapids Yellow Jackets in their first Northeastern Conference game.

Playing without the services of Jack Carden, a defensive standout in later games, and Jimmy Brown, the Bears were defeated in their season opener by Dover 46 to 29. Jack Gaskins and Bunky Stewart sparked the Bears attack by racking up 10 points apiece. The team had practiced only one week prior to the game and this had very much to do with the team's poor showing.

In the second game Aurora defeated New Bern by the close score of 30 to 23. The team missed numerous easy shots and just couldn't seem to get rolling under full steam. Fred Taylor and Bunky Stewart were high scorers with 6 points apiece.

In the return game with Aurora the Bears finally broke into the win column with a 30 to 22 triumph. Stewart and Gaskins were the top men in point production once again with 8 points apiece.

After the Christmas holidays the Bears returned to the hardwood wars with a smashing 42 to 29 upset victory over a favored Dover five. Bunky Stewart, playing his finest game of the season, hit the nets for a total of 18 points. Brown followed at a distance with 8 points. Gaskins and Craig Barnhardt, showing a lot of promise in his second year, each had 6 points. Fred Taylor and Jack Carden played their usual fine defensive game and controlled a majority of the rebounds off the Dover backboard. It was sweet revenge for an early season defeat.

The Bears opened their conference slate with a 31 to 19 win over Roanoke Rapids in a very slow moving ball game. New Bern took an early lead and held it all the way. Fred Taylor was
