It is hoped that next year, New Bern High will be allowed to send more musicians to this annual band clinic. Band sweaters have been ordered for band members. To be eligible to get a sweater, a person must be a member of good standing in the band at least one semester. The sweaters are to be solid white and the button down type. The monogram is to be red, outlined in black, and service bars for each year are to be placed on the monogram in yellow. It is expected that these new sweaters will arrive six or seven weeks after the order was placed, and we are expecting very handsome sweaters.

Continuing, Mr. McDaniel emphasized that it took more than a few individual stars to give New Bern high school its successful teams. "Stars get most of the publicity," he said, "and perhaps that is as it should be, but back of those stars, and equally important to the team, are unsung youngsters whose fine play means the difference between victory and defeat."
