The American Tubercular Association has clinics and mobile X-ray units to help curb Tuberculosis in North Carolina.

in New Bern and were at the service of the public. A number of T. B. cases were discovered in our schools and these by now have been cured. In fact one of these cases was a well-known and active member of the Senior class that year.
