GIRLS BASKETBALL

The 1950 season brought good fortune to the New Bern Bruins. Winning four out of four, the girls opened their season with a 50-35 win over Morehead City. New Bern edged the Jacksonville lassies out of a win by defeating them 33-31. On the Camp Lejeune court the girls came out on top with a win of 41-35. The last game in 1950 with Camp LeJeune on the New Bern court proved the Bruins victorious with a 45-35 win.

The first game in 1951 was with Alliance on the Jasper court. The New Bern lassies took the lead during the first few minutes of the game. At half time the Alliance girls led 20-10, and continued to lead throughout the remainder of the game. The New Bern guards held the Alliance team to five points the last half while New Bern scored nine points, but this was not enough to win over the opposing team. The high scorers were Harman with eight points and Patterson with five points.

January 9 and 10 brought good fortune to the Bruins when they deefated Edenton and Jasper respectively. The girls walked away with the game Tuesday night with the Edenton Aces by deteating them 60-30. The entire squad saw plenty of action. The team was led by Pat Patterson with 20 points, Jeanie Hancock with 15 points, Emalou Harmon with 14, Doris Blow with 6, and Sybil Kellum with 4 points. The guards played an exceptionally good game holding their opponents to 30 points. The lassies defeated Jasper 31-19 Wednesday hight. The Jasper girls played without the aid of their star who suffered injuries in the beginning of the game. The New Bern girls played one of the best games of the season.

Emalou Harmon led the Bruins with 12 points, followed by Pat Patterson with eleven.

VARSITY BASKETBALL

With three first-string players graduating, most students looked forward to a just fair basketball season but it has been every thing but that. After a loss to Morehead City and the State "B" Champions Camp Lejeune, the Bears defeated Jacksonville and staged a raging comeback to defeat Lejeune by one point.

The Bears then traveled to Greenville when they suffered a 50-30 setback, but they then went to Edenton where they swamped the "Aces." Gerald Bass and "Junie" Lingman were the standouts for the Bears although they were not regulars. Next they invaded Washington, where they had not seen a win in three seasons. This was their night and they brought home a 49-45 victory. The spirit of this game was a sight to behold.

Bunk Stewart and James Diffee have been the scoring aces for New Bern so far this season with Jack Gaskins and Bud Williams close on their heels. "Wimpy" Henderson has provided nearly all of the Bears rebound strength and is one of the defensive men on the team. He has also been dropping quite a few 2points for the team.

Hugh Brite, the regular substitute, is gone from the team as he is in the Air Force and his place has been taken by "Junie" Lingman.

Although the team is plagued with the loss of players, and short practice periods, their moral is. high and determination mountainous. Support your team: if there is any way possible to see a game, go.

It's a cold winter, but those long glorious spring and summer days are getting closer all the time. Let's all really do some studying before then because we all want to be seniors next year.


We are losing some of our boys who are going into service. Let's wish them good luck in their service for our country. We'll certainly miss them all.
