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Peace in time of war

upon us that due to its charisma ellipses our attention from world problems, to allow us (for 20 days or so) to act like humans.

However, it is a paradox of our times that with our desperate need for peace, we allow war. War is a complex institution (which I believe over the centuries war has become). It is something that cannot be dismissed at will.

The poll in this issue was to concern itself with the military and war. We found, in attempting to take this poll, that most students recognize its complexities and have thought about the problem. Previous polls have leaned to the general sphere of things. The scope of these polls is not such that really specific details can be considered. However, the persons asked seemed unwilling to commit themselves to generalities. They recognized that the military problem has no black and white answers. For these reasons no accurate poll percentages could be gleaned. While the results of the poll are somewhat necessarily vague and not intended to accurately reflect New Bern High Students' attitudes, we are happy to know that the students do recognize this as a complex issue.

We did infer from the pol! the following "preferences".
Most male students seemed happy with the new draft lottery. Few people felt the war in Viet Nam was not justified, and most felt that we should see the war to its end. Most incidentally, felt the end was five years away. Few students think the South-Vietnamese will ever become able to fight on their own. Students feel that Nixon is not only handling the war better than LBJ, but as well as can be expected under the circumstances. Many feel the Paris talks are



The time of year is once again accomplishing little but that they should not be terminated.

It seems that the current level of military spending is acceptable and that present defense systems are adequate. In spite of the un-disereability of a draft (no matter how well liked) few people want an entirely volunteer army. It can be said that escalation is wanted in so much as many feel that would bring the end nearer. However escalation should be limited to resumption of the bombing and invasion of the North is not wanted as told by a majority of students. Few people see draft dodgers as traitors.

Most people think the Military-Industrial complex has not exceeded its suppossedly limited capacity in the American economic system. Finally W W III will be started initially by Israel and the various Arab states. However students say Russia and Red China run a close second.

We hope the imprecision of the poll can be excused. It may have turned out for the better however. Tangible figures do tend to lower spirits on matters such as these.

Deep down in our hearts (The above was used by the SDS in their "revolution" in Chicago in the week preceding the October 15 Moratorium). The student radical is a staunch supporter of "liberation movements", whether or not those who want liberation have anything to be liberated from, and if there is a shortage of liberation movements, they can always create one. The student radical wants nothing short of total revolution, or what Abbie Hoffman, Yippie leader, wrote of in his book, REVOLUTION FOR THE HELL OF IT.

What makes the student radical tick? Why does he do what he does? Perhaps Dr. Samuel L Hayakawa, who was acting president of San Francisco State College during the student strike there last year, has some answers, or at least some questions that suggest someanswers. Last spring he put the following question to a Congressional subcommittee:

Can we give a superior education to gifted young people without their ending up believing they are a superior order of being,

immune to control by custom or law, exempt from the responsibilities of rational discourse and debate, but nevertheless entitled by their superiority to dictate the lives and fortunes of others?

Hayakawa, among others, has observed certain trends and attitudes in some American student and teacher groups:

-Those who do well in high school and on college entrance exams therefore are in the more prestigious colleges and universities and may begin to consider themselves superior.

-Feeling superior, they may not feel themselves bound by traditional conventions, restraints and values. Thus they may make a cult of hedonism (the philosophy of pleasure), enjoy shocking their parents and elders by outrageous dress and behavior, and revel in civil disobedience.

-They may have a great contempt for the democratic process, through which people of lesser intellectual achievement have the same powers and rights as they do.

-Having always had their way when they wanted it, they find it tiresome and frustrating to have to argue and debate calmly and rationally with any officials or authorities. Thus they find it justifiable to impose their will upon others by ignoring or shouting down rational objections or by using violence if they feel it necessary.

-Mixed in with all of this is a sentimental identification with the downtrodden, the poor, the poverty-stricken, and the victims of racial discrimination and war. This gives rise to their support of "liberation movements" and

gives them a false, superficial, hypocritical moral base on which to rational their actions.

Obviously, some revisions must be made in our educational

system. Until they are made, what is going to happen as more and more of these intellectual elititists enter business, education and government?



the students to communicate with each other, and to stimulate student responsibility, or get the student to be responsible for his learning. These sound pretty abstract I know, but the program is built around these ideals. There are three types of study designed to bring about the above purposes. On Monday, Wednesday, Friday, what is called SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION occurs. This entails the teacher sitting with her "small group" and stimulating conversation among the students. Ideally, the teacher says nothing, but guides the conversational highways.

On Tuesday and Thursday LARGE GROUP INSTRUCTION often provides food for thought for the small group. The large group may consist of 100-200 students at a time who are lectured to, shown a film, provide a panel discussion or whatever.

The third type of study is the students' responsibility. This is independent study time. The student goes to a subject laboratory (or study room where his materials are provided) and works on his own. Instead of being given a textbook, he is provided with a booklet called a LAP (Learning Activity Package) that includes all the work and explanations for the student over a unit of work. The student works on his LAP at his own rate; when he finishes, his is given another one. These LAPs are written by the teachers or by the teams, since teachers work in teams as a unit. Thoroughly confused?! "You ain't heard nothin' yet!" The day is divided into 21 modules or "mods". each 20 minutes long. If a student has, say five classes of 2 "mods" each, he has a little over three hours in class. This leaves five hours. What he does, or what he studies these five hours, is up to him. Every Friday he makes out his own schedule, writing down what labs he will be in, when he will take his break, eat his lunch, attend class, and so forth.

In addition, the school boasts of such unique aspects as having its own Air Force ROTC on campus, some 21 vocational courses such as masonry, plumbing, cosmetology, auto mechanics, forestry, electricity, hair dressing, horticulture, etc.

The physical plant itself is plush. \$45,000 worth of carpeting cover the floors and absorbs the noise; air conditioning keeps us cool, the old cafeteria has given way to three vending rooms; the library is double-decker with a sky-lighted "pit" in the center for students to sit around and read, a man-made lake, still muddy, reminds us that an openair amphitheater will one day be constructed around it for outdoor dramatic performances; the school has its own television station which has not been set up yet; and computers do all the scheduling and will fill out the report cards.

This sounds like a lot that Pinecrest has, but look at what it DOESN'T have: a gymnasium(all our games are played off campus), an auditorium, a student center for students to go and socialize. But the four billion dollars from the Federal Government has been spent - where do we go from here?

No, Pinecrest is NOT perfect: but it may come close to it one day. Of course, none of us teachers will be sane enough to EN-JOY it, but that's beside the point.

I urge you to visit me here. I would love to show you Pinecrest - you need to keep abreast of the educational advances your state is making. We can all learn from seeing different ideas and

attempts.




