After a week of hard workouts and many hours of diligent instruction, the High School "Bears" defeated the Greenville "Phantoms" by the score of 13-0.

Brite kicked off for the Bears, the ball was fumbled by Greenville and New Bern recovered. After a sustained drive the Bears scored and Joe Anthony connected to make the score 7-0. The ball seesawed back and forth for the remainder of the quarter, but late in the second quarter Swindell scampered 14 yards over.

Excellent blocking by the linemen paved the way for hard-driving Westbrook, Lingman, and Swindell, and the fine defensive brought the Greenville team to a screaming halt.

Forney Hoke, the injured first string quarterback, showed courage and determination when he played on a very bad ankle. However, he had to be relieved in the third quarter by Roy Fagan, who displayed remarkable ball handling and field general abilities.

Mark Skinner, Joe "Booze" Hodge, Hardy Swindell, Jack Gaskins and Junie Lingman were on the sick list at game time but played despite their injuries.

A WORD FROM THE COACH

The 1950 New Bern High School football team is one with hopeful possibilities to my way of thinking. This is the best group of boys we have assembled on the gridiron in the past four years. By "best", I mean they possess those characteristics which go to make a successful football team — fighting spirit, courage, aggressiveness, speed, strength, the will to win, and a desire to improve.

The quality that I cherish most among our boys is the desire to improve. The lack of this quality has caused many an early season winner to slip into mediocrity and ultimately it spells failure. It's commonplace to see Glenn Eure, Forney Hoke, Hilton Elks, Charles Henderson, Travis Barden, Roy Fagan and many others going on to the field as early as possible to work on their weaknesses and to correct the mistakes they made previously.

The two games we have played thus far have already demonstrated their desire to improve. In the Oxford game we showed signs of physical fatigue early in the game. There was a lack of smoothness in the ball handling of our backs, the blocking and

Next Spring, some lucky student at New Bern High School should be eligible to compete for one of three Science Scholarships sponsored by the Bausch & Lomb Optical Co., at the University of Rochester.

At graduation, the school presents to the outstanding science student the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award. This Award is used in thousands of schools throughout America to stimulate the interest of students in the study of science and to recognize high scholastic accomplishment. Only winners of the Honorary Science Award can compete for the Bausch & Lomb Science Scholarships.

To be eligible to compete, the Science Award winner should be selected and notified early in the year. Upon notification, the student should immediately obtain application blanks from the Director of Admissions, Morey Hall, River Campus, University of Rochester, Rochester 3, New York. Applications must be filled out and returned on or before March 10.

During the following month, the University Scholarship Committee reviews all applications. Basing their judgment on the information contained, they select several of the most promising as finalists. These are notified of their selection late in March. Finalists are invited to Rochester for two days, with all expenses paid, for interviews and competitive tests.

Each of the three Scholarships has a cash value of \$3,200.00. The University of Rochester also offers other Scholarships of equivalent value. Several of these Scholarships usually are awarded to runners-up in the Bausch & Lomb competition. At the present time, there are 23 students enrolled at the University under Bausch & Lomb Science Scholarships and 23 more who have received other scholarships, or a total of 46.

Any students who stand near the top of their class in science studies should check with the head of the Science Department early in 1951, to determine their
