

The New Bern Bears are having a successful season! Under Coach Bob Doak's Coaching, and assisted by "Chuck" Conner and "Mike" Jowdy, the Bears are out in front with hopes "running high" for the Northeastern Conference Championship for 1946. With a 19-13 defeat over Elizabeth City Friday hight, the Bears have only one more game to win—they must have a victory over Washington's Pam Pack next week. (Editor's Note: The Bears defeated Washington 7-0.)
