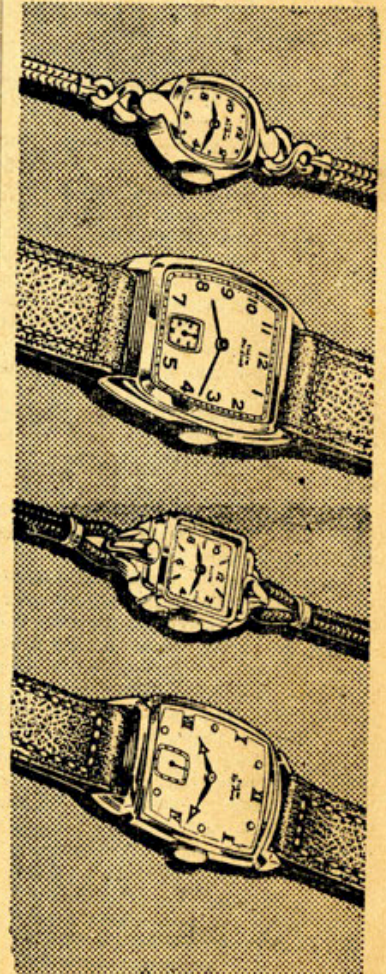

## BEARS PLAY WINNING BALL

The New Bern Bears are having a successful season! Under Coach Bob Doak's Coaching, and assisted by "Chuck" Conner and "Mike" Jowdy, the Bears are out in front with hopes "running high" for the Northeastern Conference Championship for 1946. With a 19-13 defeat over Elizabeth City Friday night, the Bears have only one more game to win—they must have a victory over Washington's Pam Pack next week. (Editor's Note: The Bears defeated Washington 7-0.)

In conference games, the Bruins defeated Greenville High 25-0; against Roanoke Rapids the Bears "nosed out" a 29-18 triumph; the victory over Tarboro was 32-0; the battle with Kinston drew a tie, 12-all. Friday night's game with Elizabeth City was one of the most exciting of the season.

In non-conference games, the Bears started off the season with a 18-6 defeat by Goldsboro High school; Durham High School's "B" team invaded Kafer Park and rushed the Bears off their feet with a crushing defeat of 38-0.
