NEW BERN STUDENT COUNCIL AT GOLDSBORO

Monday morning October 24th three of the Student Council members of New Bern High School left for Goldsboro to attend the North Carolina Student Council Convention. They were: Dollie S. Bray, Jack Gaskins, Jackie Burnette, and Mrs. Hunnings, advisor. They arrived in Goldsboro and registered about 12 o'clock. The opening address was given by Dr. Leo Jenkins of ECTC, his topic was "Tomorrow Belongs To Those Who Prepare Today." An address was given, by Mrs. Hilda Koch, a German refugee, on behalf of "Foreign Affiliation with Schools." She stressed the point that we should appreciate our American heritage which we take for granted. Monday night the convention was entertained at a barbecue at the cliff, just outside Goldsboro.

Tuesday, after a concert given by the Goldsboro Hi-Band, each delegate attended a discussion group on the following: "Preparing For Tomorrow Through Student Council," this group discussed preparation for students in civic, social, and religious stations in life. Another group discussed "Preparing for Tomorrow by Creating Leaders Today" to create in students a realization of the characteristics essential for good leadership. A third group was "preparing for Tomorrow Through Understanding Today" to know and understand causes of international disturbances. Tuesday night the delegates attended a banquet at the Goldsboro Hotel and a dance at the Woman's Club.

SCHOOL LIFE IN GERMANY

"Dave Cozart Tells All"

Are you disgusted with school? Do you grumble about having so much home work? Well, you shouldn't!! And here's why.

Let's take a trip to Germany. Here, we find that most school students have it pretty rough compared to school life in America. To begin with most students in Germany start school at the age of six and when they are ten their parents decide whether they are able to send their children to Trade School, Middle School or High School. Believe it or not - this is a very hard decision to make, especially when the child is only ten. How is he supposed to know? In case you are wondering what is the difference between these schools, the Trade Schools train students for certain menial occupations. If you graduate from this school, you are a plain working man. Now if you are able to go to a Middle School, you may graduate as a skilled laborer or lower official. But if you are able to pay for it, you may go to a German High School. Only a small percentage of the German youth at-

tend these schools. These are mostly the elite. Since the war, the Allied Military Government Education authorities have tried to change this more or less "class system," but are probably not so successful.

If you were an ordinary student of a German High school, you might study about eight subjects at a time. A typical course would include religion, German, English, Latin, history, mathematics, biology, art and geography. Tough, huh? Just read on!! As a general rule, their school teachers are very strict and try to be "little dictators" in their class rooms. In order to graduate from High School - you must take a written exam on everything you've had since you started school at the age of six!! If you are able to struggle through this and pass, you must then take an oral exam. You must take this exam in front of a board, which as a rule, is composed of two or three teachers, the principal, the superintendent, the mayor, and others. This exam consists of one or two sub-

TWO WINS AND A LOSS

The New Bern High School Bears edged the Edenton Aces out of a Northeastern Conference game. The Bears won the game by a single touchdown. After receiving the Edenton kickoff on the 45 yard line, New Bern advanced to the 20 yard line, where Fred Taylor tossed a pass to Junie Lingman for the winning touchdown. Jack Gaskins kicked the extra point.

The Bears kept the ball most of the first half with a few spectacular plays made by several of the New Bern players. Co-captain Jimmy Brown received a pass from Fred Taylor and scored another touchdown, which was called back because of a penalty against the Bears.

Early in the third quarter, Gaskins ran a punt back up the field for the third touchdown of the game. A penalty was again called on the Bears. The remainder of the game resulted in a struggle between the Aces and the Bears for the conference game. The first touchdown of the Bears proved to be the winning touchdown of the game.

The New Bern Bears lost their first game of the season to Kinston. Although our boys played hard, they couldn't stop the powerful Kinston club.

The outstanding players of the game were Hardy Swindell and Jack Carden. Swindell, the boy who made the beautiful fifty-yard run, was a standout on defense as well as offense. He got off several good runs and the Bears only touchdown. Jack Carden, the little end who spent the night in Kinston's backfield, made some mighty good tackles and caught some passes for good gains.

The following Friday the Bears traveled to Roanoke Rapids for the hardest fought game of the year. We won this game by a score of 6 to 0.
