On Friday night the game, during the half the mothers and sponsors of the senior ball players were presented flowers in an impressive ceremony, after which the band rendered appropriate selections. Following the game, a homecoming dance was held at the Recreation Center. This dance was sponsored by the Junior class to raise money for the Junior-Senior.

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keep up with the news of the U. N.

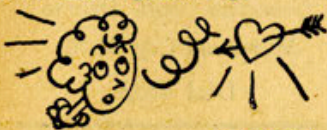

During the five years that these awards have been made, the range of subject matter covered by the nation's young photographers and submitted for consideration by the judges has been endlessly interesting. There have been pictures of the moon as shot through a telescope and close ups of the amoeba as viewed through a microscope. These photographs include school activities, beautiful scenes, action studies, and scenes of every day life.

Today, photography is contributing heavily to human progress. As a result, the experience that young people gain in making pictures now may well be of tremendous benefit to themselves and the nation in time to come.

In sponsoring this competition it has been the sincere hope of the Eastman Kodak company that it would assist student everywhere to learn more through photography, and better fit them for an active, useful, productive life.

In this recent contest, 337 awards totalling \$3,500 were given.
