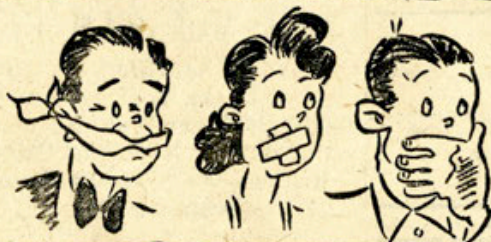

A talk on "Citizenship and How It Will Affect Our Grades" was given a member of 9-2 on Friday, January 11.

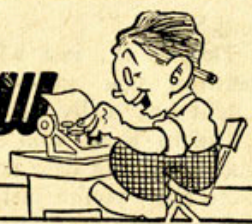
